Welcome to 2024! I hope the holiday season surrounded you with the people who bring smiles to your face and warmth to your heart. With the start of the new year comes a renewed commitment to exercise and improve our situations. Similarly, CADA is committed to adding new members to the CADA Board of Directors. As your Immediate Past President and Elections Officer, I have the privilege of introducing you to the following candidate for CADA Vice President: Melissa Edsall, currently serving as Area A Coordinator.

The candidate has officially declared her candidacy and meets the bylaws and board policy requirements. She has served at least one year on the CADA Board of Directors and is ready to make a four-year commitment to the organization. The elected member will serve one year each as Vice President, President-Elect, President, and Immediate Past President. Our candidate is enthusiastic, passionate, and committed to serving you and our organization as we progress in our mission of educating others and creating memorable experiences for our students.

WHAT TO LOOK FORWARD TO BEFORE THE CONVENTION:

Our candidate is permitted to start campaigning on January 8, 2024, immediately following our winter board meeting. This may involve launching campaign websites or social media campaigns, as well as reaching out to friends and colleagues to share their vision and goals.

In the two weeks leading up to the "CADA Spirit Games," you will receive an email from our candidate. The email will be officially sent out by CADA Central to the email on record.

At CADA Spirit Games, our candidate will personally connect with the membership during registration, social events, and between sessions. The candidate will have access to display and distribute campaign materials in the common areas of the Grand Sierra Resort. During the Thursday General Session, our candidate will be given time to address the membership, outlining her goals and aspirations.

THE VOTING PROCESS:

This is your opportunity to exercise your right and privilege to vote. After the speech on Thursday, we will call for a vote of acclamation. The newly elected Vice President will be announced at the dinner dance on Friday evening.

We will also be electing Area Coordinators for Areas B, D, and F.

To be eligible to run for Area Coordinator, a member must have served one year on their area council and be willing to serve in this role for two years. Area Coordinators are responsible for leading their areas in planning regional training events and conferences for both students and adults while representing their members on the CADA State Board of Directors. Former area council members are eligible to run for Area Coordinator up to and including five years after leaving the council.

The voting window for Area Coordinators will open on Thursday after the general session, and members from Areas B. D, and F will be eligible to vote for their coordinator. All voting information will be sent to your CADA registered email. Voting will conclude on Friday, with votes verified by multiple witnesses, including a representative from each candidate's campaign. The newly elected Area Coordinator will be announced at the dinner dance.

If you have any questions, please don't hesitate to reach out to me at <u>gmoon@cadaboard.org</u>. Please exercise your right and privilege to vote, even if you are unfamiliar with the candidates. Setting an example for your students back at home and showing respect to the candidates for taking a chance is of great importance.

MENTAL HEALTH : MAKING T.I.M.E. IN THE MORNING

Our positions are stressful and no one really understands the kind of busy that we can be. As someone who always tries to help others, I have often found that I put myself last. However, I realized what a detriment that is, not only to my students and my program but also to myself. We cannot help others if we don't take the time to take care of ourselves. And that is why the past few years I have really put an emphasis on my mornings.

As someone who would be rich if I was actually paid each time my name was said during the day, I discovered that mornings are the best place for me to focus on myself. There is a time when I do not need to worry about the needs or wants of others, but I can make time to set myself up for the best day possible. This has pushed me to wake up earlier, which you do not necessarily have to do. However, waking up earlier has given me that little extra cushion to do the activities that I know are best for me. These activities include focusing on gratitude, mindfulness, exercise, and learning.

Recently, I was delighted to discover that the activities that I was already trying to focus on in the morning are part of a routine that Jay Shetty also emphasizes in the book, <u>Think Like a Monk</u>. I might post on someone's Facebook page, write an email to a student, or send someone a text. I then try to read something that I think will either benefit myself or my profession. Sometimes if I have made more time it is a chapter from a book, other times it is just an article. For ten minutes I will go for a walk, do a yoga flow, or hop on the Peloton. I prefer to finish with meditation. Guided meditations are easier for me to focus on, so I will pick something from the Peloton app, or Headway that is five to ten minutes long. As someone who deals with anxiety and depression, this is the perfect way to end what I have come to refer to as my morning session.

Now, there are mornings where not all of these things happen. Sometimes, I am only able to write an email of gratitude, other mornings I only find time to read. No matter what, I try to make sure I perform at least one part of this morning routine because it helps me center myself. I encourage you to give it a try. And if not, please make sure you are carving out some time for yourself during the day to focus on something that you love and enjoy because you need to make sure you are a priority in your own life. And you deserve it.

Why is it essential for us to have a seat at the CIF table, both at the state and local levels? We find ourselves navigating the complex world of education, striving to make our schools the best they can be by fostering positive campus cultures and active participation. While our presence on the Federated Council over the past seven years has granted CADA a seat at the table, our mission extends to representing all 10 sections. Numerous decisions are made that directly impact student activities, finances, and the overall student experience. We must remember that athletics, like leadership, are educationbased experiences. It is imperative that we continue to collaborate for the betterment of our students and communities.

Last year, the State Executive Committee, Federated Council, and the 10 section Commissioners came together to craft a new CIF mission statement:

To quote Dr. Ron Nocetti, Executive Director, CIF State Office: "Our school communities are a place for everyone, our actions need to match that. The CIF and our member schools are committed providing to opportunities for all students. We consistently hear that our students want to have fun, be with friends, and enjoy being part of a community where they feel they belong. Let's keep those ideas at the forefront of all that we do.

school has led to a resurgence of school spirit and pride. This transformation has been primarily driven by student leadership and activities. However, we must impart the distinction that we are not part of professional or collegiate athletics; instead, we stand for Educational-Based Athletics. Your school should wholeheartedly support YOUR School. There is no place for disparaging other schools in cheers, posters, or actions. Let's endorse what is right; students must learn this. A recent conversation at a women's volleyball match with a colleague from a neighboring school underscores this point. While many posters celebrated their school positively, some demeaned their visiting opponent. I inquired about their perception of this behavior as pursuing victory with honor. Their response highlighted that they had observed this behavior at other schools, leading them to believe it was the norm. It falls upon adults to educate that this is not the

> standard in high school athletics. I posed a simple question: "What legacy do you want your school to have? A welcoming place that embraces opponents or a hostile institution that denigrates them?" The posters came down, marking a valuable teaching moment.

The terms selfie, group photo, and panorama were applied to the idea of leadership as part of our 2023 CADA Camps curriculum last summer. The "Leadership Snapshot" allowed students and advisors to take a look at their individual leadership strengths (selfie), how those strengths contribute and combine with others' strengths (group photo), and how we can take those combined strengths and positively impact our school culture (panorama).

Thanks to the 2023 CADA Camp curriculum team, led by Douglas Middle School's Melissa Edsall, with support from Jessica Banchieri (Heritage HS), Dinah Green (Orange Vista HS), and Monica Anderson (Paulding MS). This group met virtually multiple times throughout the year to plan the series of integrated lessons centered around our camp theme of Leadership Snapshot.

The camp curriculum was taught to students by credentialed CADA members, called council leaders. Nearly 70 CADA members worked throughout the summer (anywhere from one camp to all four sessions) as council leaders side-by-side with the student campers, guiding, encouraging, and helping them to create a memorable, educational, and enjoyable camp experience. The passionate and dedicated camp staff return year after year because they believe so strongly in the camp program.

To help keep things running smoothly behind the scenes was a team of directors: Paul Chylinski (logistics), Todd Arrowsmith (operations), Ron Ippolito (media/technology), and Monica Anderson (adults). This year's Camp Directors/Large Group Leaders, helping to steer the students and staff through the #CADACamps experiences were Bryan Speed (camps 1-3), Christina Hillman (camp 1), Farrah Rigo-Witt (camp 2), Corissa Stobing (camp 3), Ron Ippolito (camp 4), and Melissa Edsall (camp 4).

And finally, thanks to the CASL State Board, Sandi Kurland, and their adult advisors for their involvement with Camp 4. Board members worked as interns with the camp councils, while also presenting a Meet the Pros topic. This year's four camps trained 1,530 student leaders accompanied by 226 advisors from 163 schools across the state of California, plus some long-time friends from Georgia, Illinois, Kansas, Nevada, and Canada. Once again, we enjoyed working with our long-time educational partner, UC Santa Barbara, right next to the Pacific Ocean.

Supporting our theme and mission to inspire student leaders, our keynote speakers provided thoughtful words and encouragement for their leadership journey. Gratitude goes to Lilyan Prado-Carrillo, Kate Garnes, and Donovan Beck for sharing their hearts and stories with our campers. Plus, thanks to Isaac Lopez and Benjamin Cummings for hosting the CADA Camps Throwdown event for the second summer. This high-energy session provided campers a glimpse into a way to encourage student body involvement in a fast-paced, fun whole group session.

In addition to our keynote speakers, students also had an opportunity to attend Rotations focused on fundamental skills necessary for leadership students to successfully navigate the school year. This year's rotations focused on communication, personal leadership, and improving campus culture.

CADA/CASL Leadership Camps are an intensive 4-day experience in which students are divided into councils where they have the opportunity to meet others from around the state to share ideas, network and work on a camp project together. Students come out of camp with a solid foundation to start the school year with goals in mind for themselves and their school's activity program. they are thankful for. The beauty of this holiday comes from the fact that it is not associated with receiving and giving gifts but rather with the recognition of gratitude and the practice of saying thank you.

Coming from a family that moves a lot, I have attended a fair share of schools. The contrasts between my old elementary school and my current high school are attributed to the amount of appreciation that is shown in our community. When I was young, we never had events centered around giving thanks. It was apparent how mundane our culture was, as there were no personal relationships. Seeing how lively Ripon is, I have witnessed the power behind a thank you.

At Ripon High, everyone regards the month of November as the month of giving thanks. We work closely with Dude Be Nice, a powerful organization, to bring kindness to life at our school. Everyone has the opportunity to obtain a Dude Be Nice shirt to wear throughout their full four years. This is a plain black shirt with our school name and the words "dude be nice" in strong block letters. Although it may seem pronounced, the constant reminder on the shirt to be kind contributes to a positive atmosphere on campus. This month also focuses on giving thanks.

Our spirit days are centered around what we are grateful for. An example is when there was "grateful for our guardians," and we dressed up as soccer moms or BBQ dads. These spirit days remind us just how much we have to say thank you for. The grandest part of Dude Be Nice is selecting a staff member or teacher to honor. This person is nominated by clubs and organizations on campus to be named our dude or dudette for that respective year. The nominations reflect someone who has exemplified kindness and deserves a thank you. We then praise our dude/dudette by showering them with gifts at our rally. Since we encourage all clubs to participate in this event, the dude/dudette ends up receiving a mountain of treats and goodies. The Dude Be Nice rally is one of the most rewarding rallies to plan. Months of time and energy go into this event due to the strong message behind it. When we see how happy the dude/dudette is, we all are motivated to continue a chain reaction of gratitude.

It was a straightforward task: take out a pencil and write a letter to someone you are grateful for. I chose my mother as I cannot thank her enough for all she has done for me. 

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

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MASTER ACTIVITY ADVISOR (MAA PROGRAM AT CONVENTION

The 2024 CADA State Convention is your chance to begin your course of study to earn the Master Activity Advisor (MAA) certificate. Program completion typically takes 2-3 years. Begin the program by registering for MAA 101: Foundations for Student Activities which will be held on Wednesday, March 6 from 1:00-4:00 p.m. This seminar course, led by MAA graduates Corissa Stobing and Leah Darby will include three hours of activities, discussion, and analysis highlighting the core areas of Student Activities: Finance & Law, Communications, Organization, Curriculum, Personal Leadership, and Culture & Climate. The \$100 pre-registration cost of the course includes materials. On-site registration is \$130 and is limited to space availability.

For those who have already begun the program in a previous year, you have the opportunity to take one or two 200-level courses. Seminars will be held Wednesday afternoon from 1:00-2:25 p.m. (203 or 205) and 2:35-4:00 p.m. (204 or 208). The pre-registration cost is \$50 for each course. On-site registration is \$65 and limited to space availability.

For our new or returning MAA participants, if you're planning to attend the Pre-Con Finance & Law session hosted by CASBO on Wednesday, March 6, you can add-on the MAA course credit for 201: Finance & Law as part of that session. The additional cost is \$25 and pre-registration is required.

All courses, including Pre-Con add-ons, require participants to complete an assignment throughout the Convention as well as a post-Convention follow-up. All participants are expected to attend all Convention sessions and events to receive credit for the courses in which they are enrolled.

Through our partnership with Fresno Pacific University, we will once again be offering optional college credit for the 101, 203, 204, 205, and 208 courses. Information will be available on-site to add-on the college unit(s).

CADA members completing their MAA course of study in 2024 will be recognized on stage at the beginning of the General Session on the afternoon of Friday, March 8.

If you'll be attending the 2024 CADA State Convention in Reno and are in need of college credits to continue movement on your district salary schedule, then read on! You have two options to obtain up to 2 units of graduate-level college credit.

Option 1: Begin the Master Activity Advisor (MAA) program and add the Fresno Pacific University optional units with your MAA course.

Option 2: For members not enrolling in the MAA program, register for the Professional Development course from Fresno Pacific University as part of your Convention attendance!

Courses are graduate-level, professional development semester units of credit that are not part of a degree program but are designed to meet specific staff development needs. Through our partnership with FPU, attendees at the 2024 CADA Convention have an opportunity to purchase up to two optional college credits. A grade of Credit/No Credit (CR or NC) will be issued for all coursework. Credit is equivalent to a B grade or better. Letter grades are not issued.

Courses are available for participants in the Master Activity Advisor (MAA) Program as well as attendees of the Convention not enrolled in the MAA Program. Members may register for no more than 2 units total. Registration information will be available at the Professional Development booth at the convention registration area on Wednesday, March 6.
